**Addresses & Directions:** Services and activities are held at Holy Resurrection Church 8710, 28th Avenue East, Tacoma, 98445, unless otherwise noted. Wilkeson Services: Holy Trinity Temple, 431 Long Street, Wilkeson 98396.

**Confessions:** Go to confession before Holy Wednesday Unction. *Don't wait until the last minute!*

**Potlucks:** Here's a list of the potlucks that are scheduled during the time of this guide:

- ✓Lazarus Saturday, March 31: A lenten potluck follows Divine Liturgy.
- ✓Palm Sunday, April 1: Feast day dinner. fish will be provided, we'll set out a basket; please bring sides, salads, sweets & drinks. Wine & oil also allowed.
- ✓Pascha morning, April 8: Following the Midnight Service: Please bring easy to serve "finger foods." No fast.
- ✓Pascha afternoon, April 8: Following Agape Vespers: Your finest for your brothers & sisters! A feast! We'll have roasted lamb & pork, and a donation basket! Please bring extra meats, side dishes, desserts, drinks, and ice chests. Use disposable containers, and take home leftovers - this helps our kitchen crew tremendously. Stoves will not be available for cooking. Bring musical instruments, yard games, frisbees, blankets for the grass, folding chairs and friends, and hope for the sun! Help with clean up at 4:30 p.m.

Please help set up & clean up for potlucks- there is no scheduled crew to do this - if we all chip in it will make the meal a joy for all! This is especially true for the dinner on Pascha day, April 8. If you can arrive before the 1:30 p.m. Agape vespers to help set up tables & chairs, it would be appreciated.

**Paschal Flowers:** We count on your generosity to beautify the church. A collection box will be placed in the back of the church.

**Attire:** Reflect the liturgical observance: bright clothing on Palm Sunday & Pascha, dark for Holy Week!

**Accommodations:** Limited room is available for Holy Week and Pascha in the Parish House. Bring bedding, towels, etc. Bathrooms with hot showers and kitchen facilities are available. Speak to Fr. John.

**Choir Rehearsal:** Saturday, March 31, 12:30 p.m. We ask all choir members to be on hand for special Palm Sunday and Paschal rehearsals.

**Palm Sunday:** is celebrated with Vespers on Saturday, March 31 at 6:30 p.m. and Sunday April 1 beginning with Matins at 9:00 a.m. Come to the beautiful Matins service, where palms and branches of pussy willow are blessed and distributed. A Cross-Procession around the church will be served at the conclusion of Liturgy. A potluck (see above) with fish, wine and oil allowed will be enjoyed after services.

**Help us Read:** Orthodox Christians are asked to help read the 15 Old Testament lessons at the Vespertal Liturgy on Holy Saturday, April 7, at noon - contact Matushka Katherine. The Acts of the Apostles is read on Holy Saturday evening at 9:00 p.m. - contact Rdr. Peter Ricks. The Gospel (John 20:19-25) in many languages at the Paschal Agape Vespers on April 8 at 1:30 p.m. - contact Matushka Katherine.

**Pascha Baskets:** Pascha Baskets are blessed after the midnight Paschal service on April 8. A table will be placed on the porch or in the St. Joseph Hall in case of rain. Fill your basket with your favorite holiday foods, cover it with a white or special cloth.

**Dyed Eggs:** Color a dozen or two eggs to be distributed at Pascha! The Greek red dye we use will be available in the Bookstore, also the recipe for traditional onion skin dye is pinned to the Parish House bulletin board. Start saving yellow onion skins. Sign up in the Parish House. Tip: cook room temp brown eggs that are a couple of days old in the dye, they crack less and are easier to peel. Refrigerate after cooking. Bring them by the evening service on April 6. Please check the sign-up on the Parish House bulletin board.

**Candles:** Traditional times to hold candles: Holy Thursday evening we hold lit candles when the twelve passion Gospels are read, extinguish them in between. Holy Friday evening, especially for the processions with the shroud. The entire Paschal service! Specially decorated paschal candles will be made available in the back of the church for you, or use a bobèche (drip catcher) for a regular candle. Battery operated “candles” will be available for children under 7. Please return them to the container in the back of the church!

**Pascha Afternoon Easter Treat Hunt:** Contribute to the Easter Treat hunt. Candy and toys, and we have a section for grown-ups, so contributions for that are appreciated as well. If you let us know the ages of your children on the special sign-up on the main bulletin board, we’ll have a better idea about how to portion off the lawns. Place contributions in the collection box near the Parish House bulletin board.

**Parish Altar Feast Day:** Bright Saturday Paschal Liturgy, April 14 at 10:00 a.m. This will be followed by a luncheon provided by the Holy Myrrhbearers Sisterhood.

**Bookstore:** Our Holy Trinity Bookstore has service books and other materials for your holiday needs, check it out! It is located in the Parish House, downstairs and to the right.

### The Paschal Guide

*Note on fasting: We keep a fast, no meat, dairy, fish, wine (alcoholic beverages) or olive oil allowed until after the Paschal service. Exceptions are noted in this guide: f: fish, w: wine, o: oil allowed.*

#### March

31 Saturday  
*wo, caviar*      **Lazarus Saturday.** By raising His friend Lazarus, who was four days dead, Christ confronts death: the enemy He came to conquer. The service is resurrectional in a way usually reserved for Sundays. Rejoice, rejoice O Bethany!

**10:00 a.m. Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom.**

Lenten potluck brunch.

Help prepare branches for Palm Sunday, last minute clean and prep for Pascha. Choir: Important paschal “run-through rehearsal”

**6:30 p.m. Great Vespers** of Palm Sunday with Lity. Confessions.

#### April

1 Palm Sunday  
*fwo*      **The Entrance of our Lord into Jerusalem.**  
Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus’ triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Come early to Matins, raise branches of palms and willows, singing, *Hosanna*, and accepting Jesus Christ as King and God in your life. Take your blessed branches home and place them with your icons, be sure to burn last year’s, or you can bring them to church and we’ll burn them.

**9:00 a.m. Festal Matins.** Everyone should come!

**Festal Divine Liturgy** and Procession follows Matins.

Potluck dinner: Fish, wine & oil. We’ll have the fish - please bring the rest!

**Christ the Bridegroom:** we should always be prepared for the End, when Christ appears in His second coming. The Bridegroom services on the first four evenings of Holy Week call us to remember this!

**6:30 p.m. Bridegroom Matins.** Confessions.

2 Holy Monday      **10:00 a.m. Presanctified Liturgy.**

**6:30 p.m. Bridegroom Matins.** Confessions.

3 Holy Tuesday      **10:00 a.m. Presanctified Liturgy.**

**6:30 p.m. Bridegroom Matins.** Confessions.

4 Holy Wed

**10:00 a.m. Presanctified Liturgy.**

This is the last Presanctified Liturgy of the Lenten season. At its conclusion we say the Prayer of St. Ephraim for the last time, and bid farewell to the “Lenten melodies” chanted at the litanies and other parts of the weekday services.

**6:30 p.m. Sacrament of Holy Unction.**

The Service of Holy Unction is the Mystery (sacrament) of the healing of our souls and bodies by Christ. While everyone is welcome to the service, only Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves by confession may be anointed with the healing oil.

5 Holy Thursday

**10:00 a.m. Matins of Holy Thursday**

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**2:00 p.m. The Vespertal Liturgy of St. Basil.**

This beautiful Liturgy, the Mystical Supper, celebrates the institution of the Eucharist (Holy Communion) at the Last Supper.

Soup Supper follows Liturgy.

**6:30 p.m. Matins** with the Twelve Passion Gospels.

This is the Matins of Holy Friday - the Passion and Death of our Savior. The Lord suffered on the Cross for three hours and died in order to offer you everlasting life. Please come and stand at the foot of the Cross with His most holy Mother, Mary the Theotokos, and His faithful disciple, the holy Apostle John. Be renewed in God’s Word in the telling of this sacred story.

6 Holy Friday

**10:00 a.m. The Royal Hours.**

*strict fast*

We serve 1st, 3rd, 6th & 9th Hours with Typica. Each “Hour” (about 15 minutes actually) consists of Psalms, hymns, and Scripture readings reflecting the Lord’s Passion.

Immediately following the Royal Hours we set up “the tomb” in the center of the church in preparation for the next service. Pressing cloths, arranging flowers etc. takes a little time, and everyone is most welcome to come and help.

**2:00 p.m. Vespers:** the taking down from the Cross and entombment of Christ.

**6:30 p.m. Matins** of Holy Saturday: Lamentations before the Tomb of Christ, the procession with the Holy Shroud around the church.

Truly for many people, the most beautiful service of Holy Week. We gather before the Life-giving Tomb. We chant a burial office: The entire Psalm 119, the Psalm of a Righteous Man, and between each verse we chant the *Lamentations*. Slowly, almost imperceptibly, there is movement from death towards Life, we sing the Hymns of Resurrection normally associated with Sunday Matins, we listen to a magnificent “canon” hymning the death and entombment of Christ, and waiting for His promise “I shall arise!” Then, to mark the passage of Christ through the dark netherworld of Hades, the tomb is lifted up and carried into the darkness outside, followed by the faithful bearing candles, it is carried around the church and held in the doorway as we all bow down and enter the tomb, walking beneath it, signifying that we too are buried with Christ.

7 Holy Sabbath

**11:30 a.m.** Fr. Vadim Pogrebniak hears confessions in Russian.

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**12:00 Noon. Vespertal Liturgy of St. Basil.**

Vespers is joined with the Liturgy of St. Basil. We read 15 Old Testament lessons containing images referring to Salvation History, especially those relating to Baptism, as this is the ancient service of Christian initiation. After the Epistle lesson we will transition to the Liturgy of St. Basil. Instead of Alleluia, we sing “Arise, O God, and judge the earth...” Vestments and church colors are changed from dark to bright, bay laurel leaves, symbolizing Christ’s victory over death, are scattered; the Gospel announces the Resurrection of Christ, “He is not here; for He is risen as He said!” Dried fruit, bread and wine are

blessed and distributed at the end of the service, strengthening us for the fast's final hours.

**9:00 p.m. the Reading of the Acts of the Apostles.** All Orthodox members of the parish are invited to come read a chapter or two.

**11:30 p.m. Nocturnes.** We enter the darkened church, waiting, as the last minutes of our mystical journey breaks into paschal joy.

**8 PASCHA**  
*No fast all week*

**The Resurrection of our Lord, God and Savior, Jesus Christ.**  
**Holy Pascha, the Feast of feasts.**

**12:00 a.m. Paschal Procession and Matins, and Paschal Divine Liturgy.**

The brightest, most joyful experience in the life of Orthodox Christians. At the conclusion of this service Pascha baskets will be blessed.

Following Liturgy: Break-fast in the Parish House. Please, bring something simple that doesn't require fuss & cooking, but do bring something!

**1:30 p.m. Agape Vespers**

The Gospel is read in many languages. Orthodox faithful may contact Choir Director Kathy Pierce if you would like to read. The passage is: John 20:19-25.

Easter Treat Hunt! Areas for all ages, including grown-ups! Donations of candy, little treats & treasures are appreciated!

Paschal Feast in the backyard! Your finest for your brothers & sisters! A feast! A party! No fast. We'll have roast lamb & pork, and a donation basket! 9 Bright Monday **10:00 a.m. Paschal Liturgy** in Wilkeson, Lunch in Sumner.

We'll serve Liturgy at our 118 year old chapel in Wilkeson, 10:00 a.m. To Wilkeson: take SR 410 to Buckley, watch for turn off on the right, SR 165, go 4 miles to Wilkeson, turn left after passing under the Wilkeson arch. 431 Long St. Wilkeson, 98396.

13 Bright Fri **6:30 p.m. Paschal Vespers.**

14 Bright Sat **10:00 a.m. Paschal Divine Liturgy. Parish Feastday.**

As this falls on our usual Saturday for Slavonic Liturgy, we'll include a bit of Slavonic and Russian at the service. After Liturgy, the Myrrhbearers Sisterhood will provide luncheon for all our guests.

The doors of the iconostasis have remained wide open all this past week, even when we were away from the church. The doors are closed right before we begin:
